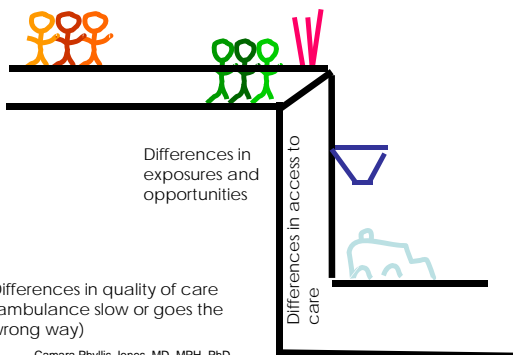

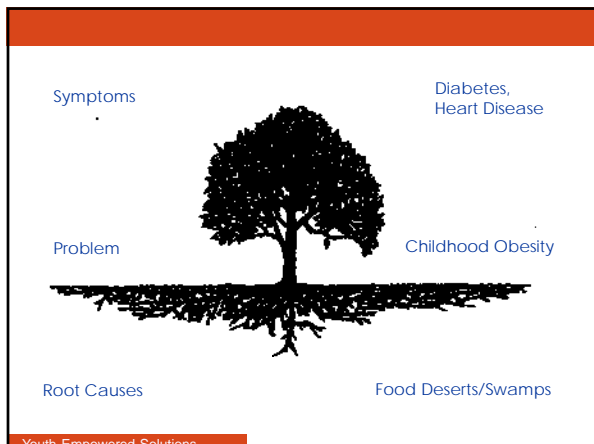

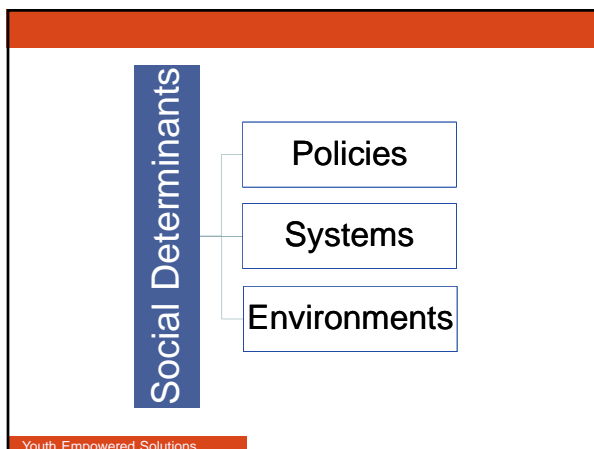

What Does This Look Like?

- **Clinton Global Initiative** commits to youth empowerment at its 2012 Annual Meeting Topic Dinner in NYC. (System)
- **Southern Obesity Summit**, a conference hosted by The Texas Health Institute – includes a youth track with the goal of reaching nearly 100 youth across the South for the first time in history. (System)
- **Myers Park High School** (Charlotte, NC) implements a Lunchroom Redesign to make the healthy option the easy option for students. (Environmental)
- **Circle K stores in Raleigh, NC** allow placement of stickers on alcoholic beverages called "alco pops" that helps distinguish them as alcoholic. (Environmental)
- **Westminster Properties** establishes a Smoke-Free Multi-Unit Housing Policy to protect it's residents from second hand smoke. (Policy)
- **NC HB693**, which would have required minors to get notarized consent for reproductive health care services was withdrawn from NC General Assembly session. (Policy)

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Skill Development

The process of strengthening skills and knowledge to improve effective decision-making, positive peer interactions and strategic community advocacy.

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Critical Awareness

The process of identifying the information and resources in order to have a deeper understanding of the "how" and "why" of positive change.

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Opportunities

The process of creating platforms for decision-making, participation and taking action which can result in community change.

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How do we quantify our outcomes from Youth Empowerment?

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2014 YES! Youth Staff Outcomes
(n=15)

100% Described a new skill that they learned
100% Told us about instances of taking action
93% Described impacting a policy, system, or environment

The average length of employment at YES! is 18 months.

80% of youth were of color, lived in a rural community, or lived in a community of low-wealth.

66% of staff at YES! are youth.

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2014 YES! Training Outcomes

942 Adults and 264 Youth
Exposed to the Youth Empowerment Model

157 Adults and 2076 Youth
Trained on Youth Empowerment and Social Determinants

99% of Both
Indicated skill growth
57% of Both
Took action

29 instances of change (Systems, Environments, Policies)
Impacting 259,957 people

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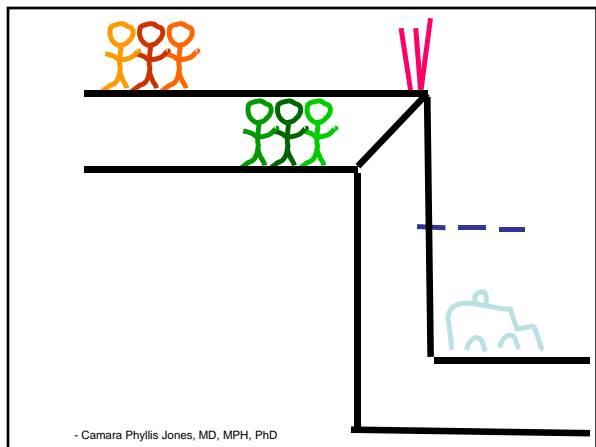

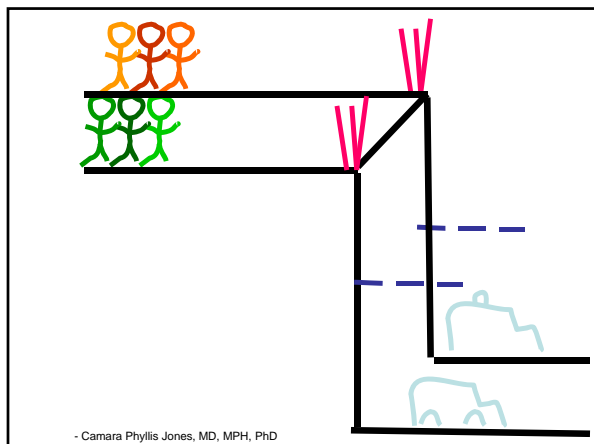
